



- 1 **AMERICAN LEGION LOT.** Veterans Area. Flag pole placed at this site in July, 1930 by the Chicopee Legionnaires. Pole lasted 70 years.
- 2 **KNIGHTS OF PITHIAS.** Monument.
- 3 **DAVID T. HARRIS.** C.S.A. One of the "Immortal 600."
- 4 **JOHN D. BAGWELL.** Started the Bagwell Manufacturing Company in Gainesville.
- 5 **LUTHER B. BRIDGERS.** Composer of the famous Christian Hymn, "He Keeps Me Singing."
- 6 **JAMES H. HUNT.** Gainesville businessman and owner of Hunt Tower.
- 7 **TOM BELL.** U.S. Congressman.
- 8 **DR. JAMES H. DOWNEY.** Built first hospital in Gainesville. Inventor of the "Downey Fracture Table."
- 9 **DR. W. C. WILKES.** Organized facility and built first building of what is now Brenau College.
- 10 **JESSE JEWELL.** Poultry businessman who led Gainesville to become "The Poultry Capital of the World."
- 11 **SUSIE ROBERTS.** One of the "Ladies of the Lake."
- 12 **MARSHALL C. OLIVER.** E-Company member from WWII's Band of Brothers.
- 13 **ALBERT LEE GILMER.** Flight Instructor and Gainesville's airport is named after him.
- 14 **THOMAS A. MCCRARY.** Youngest Regimental Commander in General Patton's Third Army
- 15 **COL. C. C. SANDERS.** C.S.A. Gainesville Banker. His statue was blown away in the 1936 tornado.
- 16 **HAROLD W. TELFORD.** His memorial stone simply says "Lost in the Alps."
- 17 **DR. HILBERT B. TINGLEY.** Doctor at Rockaway Beach, NY who mysteriously ended up buried in Alta Vista, and just as mysteriously, disappeared.
- 18 **ZACHARY T. CASTLEBERRY.** First President of Gainesville First National Bank, 1889.
- 19 **WILLIAM KITTRELL.** Gainesville Police Chief killed in line of duty, December 25, 1890.
- 20 **DANIEL BOONE.** Not the famous frontiersman!
- 21 **WILLIAM WOOD.** Owned grist mill on what is now Woodsmill Road.
- 22 **DR. J. W. OSLIN.** Surgeon, C.S.A. Delivered soon to be President, Woodrow (and Ellen) Wilson's second child born in Gainesville.
- 23 **DR. THEOPHILUS W. HENDERSON.** Double degree from Emory in dentistry and medicine.
- 24 **THEODORE MORENO.** Engineer, CSA & Dr. Ernest O. Ham - Longstreet's Doctor. With Longstreet at his passing.
- 25 **LT. GENERAL JAMES LONGSTREET.** C.S.A. Gen. Robert E. Lee's "Old War Horse."
- 26 **CAPTAIN JOHN M. VENABLE.** C.S.A.
- 27 **DR. RICHARD BANKS.** Banks County named after him by the Georgia Legislature.
- 28 **WOODMEN OF THE WORLD.** (Monument)
- 29 **GOVERNOR JAMES MILTON SMITH.** Georgia's 33rd Governor, Railroad Commissioner, Superior Court Judge, Chattahoochee Circuit.
- 30 **PICKRELL LOT.** Col. Pickrell may have been one of the earlier residents of Green Street. Family was from Nantucket.
- 31 **MATHEW FLEMING STEPHENSON.** Assayer at the Dahlonega Mint. Famous for the saying, "There's Millions In It."
- 32 **COL. J. J. FINDLEY.** Famous for "Findley Ridge" in Dahlonega. Odd fellow "star" on monument.
- 33 **GOVERNOR ALLEN D. CANDLER.** Congressman, Secretary of State, Georgia Governor, State Compiler of Records.



- 34 **THOMAS BENNETT.** First known man to be buried in Alta Vista.
- 35 **SARAH A. DUPREE.** First known woman to be buried in Alta Vista.
- 36 **ESTES' LOT.** A monument reportedly hand carved in Italy.
- 37 **RICHARD VENABLE.** Gainesville's first Lawyer. One of the older graves.
- 38 **ELIZABETH CLARK.** Operated a ferry over the Chattahoochee River. Later helped build Clarks Bridge with Richard Waters.
- 39 **DELLA MAE PARKER YOUNG.** One of "The Ladies of the Lake."
- 40 **CRIPPLE JIM SMITH.** Monument stone says he was "A Chair Mender."
- 41 **PATRICK O'NEILL.** Inventor and Patenter of the Gin Saw Filing Machine.
- 42 **COOPER B. SCOTT.** C.S.A., Reportedly fired the first cannon of the Civil War.
- 43 **JOE McDONALD VANDIVER.** Stone says "Lost At Sea." **BEDNEY J. McDONALD,** son of former Georgia Governor Charles J. McDonald.
- 44 **WILLIAM PUGH SMITH.** First Mayor of Gainesville.
- 45 **REV. C. B. LAHATTE.** Founded the Methodist College in 1880 at corner of Main and Church Streets.
- 46 **THOMAS HENRY SPAIN.** C.S.A., 64th Georgia. Became Longstreet's orderly.
- 47 **H. W. J. HAM.** Journalist, Lawyer, Nationally Famous Orator. Coined the word "Snollygoster."
- 48 **PEARCE LOT.** **Haywood J. Pearce** was the first student to enroll at Riverside Military Academy, became President at Brenau College. **SUSAN BEATTY,** actress, appeared in Broadway Production of "Oklahoma."
- 49 **E. M. JOHNSON.** Signed against the Ordinance of Secession for Hall County.
- 50 **GEORGE W. SHELTON.** Veteran of Spanish-American War.
- 51 **MATTIE MOON.** Education Leader of Gainesville and Hall County.
- 52 **DR. E. E. BUTLER.** Noted Gainesville Physician.
- 53 **"DOC" HARRISON.** Owner, with his brother "Pete" of the Gainesville Cab Company around the 1900's. Owner of land that is now "Harrison Square."
- 54 **ED JARED.** "Hump" Pilot during World War II.
- 55 **JOHN MORROW.** Mayor of Gainesville. John Morrow Parkway named after him.
- 56 **BILLY LOTHRIDGE.** Professional Football Player. College Football All-American. Runner-up for the 1963 Heisman Trophy. Played for Georgia Tech, Dallas Cowboys and the Atlanta Falcons.
- 57 **LOUISA BROWN.** Closest living relative of Ellen Wilson (Woodrow Wilson). Louisa was mid-wife at the birth of Ellen's first child, born in Gainesville.
- 58 **JUDGE J. B. GASTON.** Mayor of Gainesville. Longstreet's "Best Man" at his second wedding to Helen Dortch.
- 59 **JOSEPH BROWN.** World War II, Pearl Harbor.
- 60 **H. H. DEAN.** Attorney. Remodeled The Hudson House on the Square. Changed name to The Princeton.
- 61 **PRUITT-BARRETT MAUSOLEUM.** Mr. Guy Barrett, a local businessman, killed in the 1936 tornado.
- 62 **BORING/KOERBER MAUSOLEUM.**
- 63 **GEN. SANDY BEAVER.** President of Riverside Academy in 1913. Became owner in 1915.
- 64 **FELIX JACKSON.** Built the Jackson Building, Gainesville's first skyscraper.



- 75 **WILLIAM ASBURY BAGWELL.** Built the last wooden wagon of the Bagwell family business in the mid 1950's.
- 76 **DR. EUGENE ADAIR.** Dentist. Governor Hardman spoke at his funeral.
- 77 **DR. WALTER J. SCHIMMEL.** Gainesville's first veterinarian. Reported to be the first person to have telephone service in Gainesville.
- 78 **MANLEY LANIER "SONNY" CARTER.** N.A.S.A. Astronaut. Flew Shuttle Mission STS-33. Also a professional soccer player.
- 79 **LT. F. S. BARRETT.** Torpedo Division, C.S.A. Mined Mobile Bay prior to the famous saying of Admiral Farragut, "Damn the torpedoes; full speed ahead."
- 80 **FRANK MALIK.** 101st Airborne-WWII, Aerospace Engineer. A pioneer of U. S. Space Program.



- 67 **DAR LOT.** Contains the graves of two Revolutionary War Soldiers, Beal Baker and William Clark, also a monument to the World War I casualties.
- 68 **MERRITT J. COFER.** CSA, 14th Georgia Regiment.
- 69 **TORNADO OF 1936 MEMORIAL.** Grave of an unknown man and an unknown woman killed on April 6, 1936.
- 70 **SUNDIAL.** One of two known sundials in the Cemetery.
- 71 **AUSTIN HAMMETT.** Statue of young boy.
- 72 **MAUDE MOONEY.** Circus Trapeze Performer.
- 73 **EMORY PECK.** Music Professor at Brenau College. Composer of the song, "Sing And Be Happy."
- 74 **B. P. BYRD.** Railroad employee. His stone has the likeness of an old steam engine.



- 81 **ROBERT H. SMITH.** Gainesville's first paid Fire Chief, 1903.
- 82 **FRANCES THOMPSON, GWEN McCOY.** Died in the Winecoff Hotel fire; the most tragic in U.S. history. **SUZANNE MOORE,** a third teen, is close by.
- 83 **CHARLES WOFFORD.** Mission commander on the first private rocket launch from Cape Canaveral.
- 84 **RICHARD JUBIN.** One of the Project Managers on the rebuilding of the Pentagon after 9/11.
- 85 **MINOR W. BROWN & JORDAN HOLCOMB.** Brown was the builder of Brown's Bridge. Holcomb was a Revolutionary War Soldier.
- 86 **GENE TYNER.** Famous Grocery Store Owner.
- 87 **PERRY-TATE.** "Pink" Monument.
